We then moved to the Umbabat, in the APNR, South Africa. As always it delivered

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in spades and the hunting of elephant and buffalo was wonderful. To the gentlemen that accompanied us on that safari, I must say that the support over the past two years has been something I cannot describe in any other word than "phenomenal" thank you! To the young man who took his first buffalo, a job very well done! This was followed up with a trip to Niassa with two of these

gentlemen and some fantastic buffalo hunting, once again double rifles used and what a story they tell! One of the bulls we got a really good look at early that morning, a fickle wind and a days tracking, we caught him at 17h35 that evening, we stuck with him as we knew he was special!

Safaris in Niassa, Mozambique did finally come

to pass. To Dave and Fred Rademeyer, thank you, a lovely story, Fred wanted to do the last safari of his long career in an area that mirrored a time gone by, he wanted Africa in its traditional colours, accompanied by his son Dave and a client that he first guided as a child, now an established US outfitter herself, they came to Niassa. Once the safari ended, I needed to know if we had

delivered and yes we had! The success was as we hoped it would be, a whopping full bag on lion, leopard, buffalo and a collection of wonderful species during 21 days of hunting.

As time passes, many will often ask, "what was your most incredible safari" one has to be very considerate when such a question is answered, as I have been blessed with incredible people,

places and experiences over the 30 years I have hunted professionally. One safari will never detract from another!

Safari experiences are made up of a kaleidoscope of emotion, characters, areas, past history, conversation, commonality, connection, passion and most of all, the ability to convey the absolute passion one has for an area, species and the love of what you do, to those entrusting their investment with you!

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some, approaching old buffalo bulls within ranges that border madness, silences where the unspoken was deafening, mindless lunches of bread and cheese that tasted better than any Michelin starred meal, searing midday October heat, tsetse fly, breathtaking sunsets, campfire magic and all of this in the mixing bowl that is Niassa L7, Mozambique and you had the quintessential
